OBAMA APPOINTS PEB 243 TO INVESTIGATE BLET CONTRACT DISPUTE

n October 6, President Barack Obama established Emergency Board (PEB) No. 243 to investigate and make recommendations for settlement of the current disputes between the Rail Labor Bargaining Coalition (RLBC) and five other unions, and the National Carriers Conference Committee (NCCC). The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen (BLET) is one of the 6 unions that comprise the RLBC.

The PEB was empanelled effective October 7, 2011, just hours before the BLET and its members would have gone on a national strike.

In total, the 11 rail labor unions involved in the dispute represent 75 percent of all rail workers in the United States who work for major Class 1 railroads.

The five-member PEB now has 30 days to investigate the dispute and make recommendations to President Obama regarding a settlement of the contract disputes. There is another mandatory 30-day cooling off period that follows.

PEB 243 will conduct hearings in Washington, D.C., beginning on October 13 and they are expected to last until October 20.

If the PEB recommendations fail to lead to a voluntary settlement, then the parties would be free to engage in self-help once again at the expiration of the second 30-day cooling off period, which would be December 6, 2011.

It is possible for Congress to intervene and legislatively mandate a settlement. If this is done, Congress typically would take the recommendations of the PEB and write them into law.

President Obama appointed the following individuals to the PEB: Ira F. Jaffe, Chair; Roberta Golick, Member; Joshua M. Javits, Member; Gil Vernon, Member; and Arnold M. Zack, Member.

The ongoing dispute over wages and health care benefits dates to early 2009 when negotiations began between the BLET and NCCC for a new collective bargaining agreement.

The Railway Labor Act (RLA) governs contract negotiations between the parties. The appointment of the PEB comes at the close of the mandatory 30-day cooling off period, a step in the RLA process that began on Sep-

tember 6, 2011. That's when the National Mediation Board (NMB) released the BLET and the 10 other RLBC unions from mediation with the rail carriers.

At the expiration of the cooling off period, either party could have engaged in self-help: a strike by labor or a lock-out by management, at 12:01 a.m. EDT on Friday, October 7. To that end, the BLET conducted a strike authorization vote that concluded

on October 3. An overwhelming 97 percent of BLET members voted in favor of the strike.

In his message sending the Executive Order to all General Chairmen, President Pierce said, "I know that you were all prepared to assist the National Division in leading our members in a job action had it been necessary and legal. Please remember that the attached Executive Order effectively bars us from any form of self help until December 6, 2011. During the next 60 days, it is imperative that we continue our effort to strengthen our networks and remain vigilant to the fact that we may face circumstances similar to today's on December 6th.

"I speak for all of us here at the National Division in passing on our thanks for everyone's continued support in our efforts to bring this bargaining round to a successful conclusion."

The RLBC is comprised of: Teamsters Rail Conference members BLET and the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employes Division; the Brotherhood of Railroad Signalmen; International Brotherhood of Boilermakers; National Conference of Firemen and Oilers of the Service Employees International Union; and the Sheet Metal Workers International Association.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen represents 55,000 professional locomotive engineers and trainmen throughout the United States. The BLET is the founding member of the Rail Conference, International Brotherhood of Teamsters. @@

he BLET's 76th annual Southwestern Convention Meeting (SWCM) opened in El Paso, Texas, on September 20 with nearly 200 BLET members and officers in attendance.

BLET National President Dennis Pierce delivered the keynote address, giving members a brief update regarding the national strike authorization vote currently underway as a result of the impasse reached during the latest round of collective bargaining.

"The railroads' demands that our membership give concessions on health and welfare benefits when railroads are making record profits is just one more example of the war being waged against the working men and women of this country. Our members can count on one thing throughout this process," President Pierce said. "We will fight with every tool we have to protect the compensation and benefits that we have fought for decades to win."

BLET PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BY DENNIS R. PIERCE

Thanks for Joining the Fight

his month's BLET Newsletter devotes primary coverage to our ongoing and yet to be resolved dispute with the National Carrier's Conference Committee over the current round of bargaining. As you all know, the deadline for us to have the right to exercise self help came perilously close to lapsing before President Obama signed an Executive Order on October 6th appointing a Presidential Emergency Board to hear the dispute and issue recommendations. Like all of you, the National Division was prepared to exercise self help in the form of a strike, but the Executive Order triggered additional steps of the Railway Labor Act delaying our right to do so. Although the Carriers have

given us little choice but to exercise self help when and where permissible to settle our dispute, all members should understand any decision as serious as this one must not be taken lightly. That is why it was important to poll the members on the involved railroads to determine their decision on the question of striking. As Chairman of BLET National Wage Committee, my primary objective is to reach a voluntary settlement in this bargaining round. The other members of our Team, First Vice President Lee Pruitt, Vice President Willard Knight, and General Chairmen Jim Louis, Tony Smith and Pat Williams were all in agreement on this objective. In fact, the members of the National Wage Committee have each participated in on property negotiations that led to voluntary agreements, and more importantly, to voluntary agreements that the membership have ratified. So we certainly have a team in place that can get the job done.

That has not been possible to this point, and for that reason, I asked all members to vote "Yes" on the strike authorization question, so the National Division could move forward with a clear

mandate. The vote also sent a message to all watching that BLET's democratic principles, which place important decision making power in the membership's hands, truly do work.

I am proud to say that we received an overwhelming response in that polling. Ninetyseven percent (97%) of those who took the time to participate voted to strike. As in any quest for voter turnout, I must thank those of you who are part of your property's Mobilization Network. This BLET network is perhaps the strongest in all of rail labor and the level of participation that BLET achieves on important issues is due in large part to your grass roots efforts to encourage your Brothers and Sisters to vote. I have often said that unionism is not a spectator sport, and I am very proud of our membership for taking the time to participate in this important vote at this even more critical point in time.

There are many reasons we are at impasse with the Carriers, in this bargaining round, and I

would like to touch on just of few of them again. As you know by now, working class Americans have been under a relentless attack in the workplace for some time now. The Carrier's demands for concessions in our Health and Welfare benefits are no different. That is painfully obvious when you consider that the Carriers have never argued an inability to pay for our insurance benefits. Quite the opposite, the Carriers are making record profits. Their push for concessions is for one reason, to increase those profits at the expense of the working class employees that BLET and the other Coalition unions represent.

This shameful push by the Carriers to make what is yours theirs comes at a time when working class Americans are under attack across the board. It started with the public sector workers, with States and municipalities using budget shortfalls to justify reducing salaries and benefits for state and city employees. Although the Carriers cannot make the same argument, | BLET NATIONAL PRESIDENT

they are piggybacking on the same mentality. They insist that the employees go backwards financially, for the sole purpose of advancing their own profits. It is apparent to me that BLET and the Rail Labor Bargaining Coalition (RLBC) could have reached a voluntary settlement in this round if not for the Carrier's refusal to drop its disgraceful demand for concessions, but that has yet to happen.

I have stated since becoming BLET National President that I would not agree to the Carrier's demands for concessions, and that is why I felt compelled to ask for a yes vote on the question of striking. Now that the membership has spoken loud and clear, you can trust that BLET's position in this battle will not waiver. Although no one can predict the final outcome in this fight, to preserve our standard of living and way of life, I can guarantee you that BLET and the Teamsters Rail Conference will continue to put every ounce of our energy into the fight. For now, that energy is going into making our case to Presidential Emergency Board 243.

In the meantime, please work even harder to make your Mobilization Networks and Strike Committees stronger. Again, while our first choice is to reach a voluntary settlement, no such settlement will be reached if it includes the concessions that the Carrier's demand. If no settlement is reached or an agreement is not imposed by December 6, 2011, then BLET and the other involved rail unions will again reach the point where self help may be legal and — more importantly necessary. I trust that you will all stand with me in unison, if we reach that point, where yet again your support and participation will be vital to our success.

fficial communications between BLET members and the National Division require a hard copy of the correspondence, bearing a signature, being received by the National President to be considered an "official communication." This is to provide that the actual question(s) are addressed, and ensures that when official

interpretations are made they have reference to a specific request and can be used in future correspondence.

The volume of e-mails received makes it impossible for the National President to answer all unofficial communications. Therefore, it is the policy of the BLET that e-mails addressed to the National President will be reviewed and forwarded to the appropriate officer or staff for a timely response; however, an e-mail message is not considered an official communication.

Moreover, anonymous e-mails and emails that do not provide sufficient information concerning the sender to enable National Division staff to confirm the sender's membership status will not receive any reply or acknowledgement. This policy is intended to allow the National President to be aware of the opinions and suggestions of the membership, while at the same time providing a timely response to the member's unofficial communication, if a response is necessary, without needlessly expending limited BLET resources.

told a Labor Day crowd in Detroit that there's a war on workers – a war we didn't start, but one we intend to fight.

Rich corporations are outsourcing the jobs of long-time workers or demanding concessions as never before – just because they think they can. Corporate-backed politicians give lip service to shared sacrifice even as they balance their budgets on the backs of working families. Public sector jobs are being cut, collective bargaining rights attacked and essential services slashed – sometimes to pay for corporate tax breaks.

But we're fighting back. That's what Teamsters do – we stand up for what is right.

Teamsters have marched in California, collected signatures in Ohio, rallied in the streets of New York, gone to court in Florida, stormed the Statehouse in Wisconsin, walked picket lines around the country and even driven a copy of a Maine labor mural to an art exhibit in Maryland.

This fight is about the economy, it's about jobs and it's about rebuilding America. As I said recently, we all have to vote in order to take anti-worker politicians out of office.

The jobs crisis is an American problem. It isn't President Obama's problem and it isn't a Republican or Democratic problem. All Americans need to come together to create good jobs for the good of our economy and the good of our great country.

I stand by my criticism of elected officials who are out to destroy the middle class. I will never apologize for standing up for my fellow Teamsters and all American workers.

BLET recognizes 10th anniversary of 9-11 at EUMA convention in Long Island

he BLET's 73rd annual Eastern Union Meeting Association (EUMA) kicked off in Long Island on August 3 with a solemn memorial service to mark the 10-year anniversary of the September 11 terrorist attacks.

During the convention's opening ceremony, a memorial wreath was placed at the front of the convention hall and BLET members held a moment of silence to commemorate those who lost their lives on 9-11.

In spite of the bravery shown by union workers on that tragic day, the country's attitude towards unions has changed over the past 10 years — and not for the better.

"Union police officers and firefighters who gave their lives in the line of duty on 9-11 were considered heroes," BLET National President Dennis R. Pierce said. "Today, unfortunately, unions and union members are under attack in a national War on Workers."

During his opening remarks, President Pierce discussed legislation in Wisconsin, Ohio and other states to destroy unions by stripping away their members' collective bargaining rights. While these attacks by extremist politicians have been harmful to unions, workers have risen to the occasion and become more active than they have in decades.

"These attacks have brought people together to fight for their rights," President Pierce said. "We cannot match the financial clout of these huge corporate entities, but our persistence, dedication and political activity can help to make up for it."

His words were echoed by U.S. Representative Carolyn McCarthy (D-N.Y), the convention's keynote speaker.

She shared a message of unity and political activism in the face of attacks against unions.

"We are Americans and we are proud of the work we do," she said. "When you go back home, please continue the fight. Continue to organize and talk to your member of Congress."

EUMA Chairman Mark Kenny (Amtrak General Chairman) opened the convention and welcomed everyone to Long Island. The members of BLET Division 269 hosted the 73rd annual EUMA, with Brother Jim Brown acting



as Arrangements Committee Chairman, and Scott Decker and John Bove acting as Arrangements Committee Co-Chairmen.

Also during opening ceremonies, BLET members heard presentations by Anita Caruso, BLET Auxiliary National President; and Margo Storsteen, BLET Division 57 and BLET Representative on the Teamsters Human Rights Commission.

During the closed meeting that followed, BLET members enjoyed a presentation by Teamsters International Vice President John Murphy, who serves as Director of the Teamsters Rail Conference. Members also heard a detailed report from National President Pierce, as well as updates from First Vice President Lee Pruitt, National Secretary-Treasurer Bill Walpert, Vice President & National Legislative Representative John Tolman, Vice President Mike Twombly, Vice President Gil Gore, Vice President Cole Davis, and Vice President Steve Bruno.

It was announced during the closed meeting that the 2012 EUMA will be held in Atlantic City, N.J., August 19-24, 2012, to be hosted by Matt Kronyak and the members of BLET Division 235. EUMA delegates also voted to hold the 2013 EUMA in Baltimore, Md., to be hosted by Fred Cox and the members of BLET Division 52.

While opening ceremonies were held on August 3, the convention began with workshops on August 2. Members participated in a workshop for Legislative Representatives, conducted by Ohio State Legislative Board Chairman Tim Hanely, and a hazardous materials training workshop conducted by Carl W. Fields, Coordinator of the BLET Safety Task Force. Many members also attended a workshop regarding the Federal Railroad Administration's new passenger rail Hours of Service regulations.

The afternoon concluded with a closed meeting for BLET members, who heard detailed reports from National President Pierce; First Vice President Lee Pruitt; National Secretary-Treasurer Bill Walpert; National Vice President & National Legislative Representative John Tolman; National Vice President Mike Priester; and National Vice President Cole Davis.

Members took advantage of numerous educational workshops throughout the remainder of the week. 

BLET MEMBER TODD BURCKHARD, 35, was killed in the line of duty on August 19 when the crew van he was riding in was involved in a collision near Frazer, Mont.

Brother Burckhard was a BNSF locomotive engineer and member of BLET Division 695 in Minot, N.D. He first joined the Brotherhood on November 1, 2010. He had about seven years of railroad

Also killed in the accident was BNSF conductor Blaine Mack, 56, who had more than 36 years of service with the railroad.

The crew van driver, a contractor, was hospitalized for minor injuries. The crew

van was traveling westbound on Highway 2 when it was struck by an eastbound pickup truck operating in the westbound lane of traffic.

"This tragedy is an example of the risks our members face each and every day in crew van transportation," **BLET National President Dennis Pierce** said. "Our deepest sympathies go out to the Burckhard family, particularly Brother Todd's wife and two young children. This tragedy has deeply touched our BLET family in Minot and I want them to know that they are in our thoughts and prayers as well."

Brother Burckhard is survived by his wife, Corrie; children Marty and Mattson; parents David and Peggy Burckhard; grandparents; and several brothers and sisters.

Instead of flowers, the family asks that memorials be sent to an educational fund for Brother Burckhard's children. c/o their mother, Corrie Burckhard, 1510-12th St. SE, Minot, ND 58701.

Tragically, Brother Burckhard is the sixth BLET member killed in the line of duty thus far in 2011 (Stanley L. Watts, February 8, 2011l; Thomas J. Kenny, March 23, 2011; Tom Anderson, April 17, 2011; Christopher L. Carter, May 1, 2011; and James G. Hadden, May 24, 2011). 00

BLET FEES OBJECTOR POLICY

1. EMPLOYEES RIGHTS

a. Any employee covered by a union or agency shop agreement in the United States has the legal right to be or remain a nonmember of the Union. Nonmembers have the legal right (1) to object to paying for Union activities not related to collective bargaining, contract administration and grievance adjustment, and to obtain a reduction in fees for such activities; (2) to be given sufficient information to intelligently decide whether to object; and (3) to be apprised of internal Union procedures for filing objections. Em $ployees\ who\ choose\ to\ object\ have$ the right to be apprised of the percentage of the reduction, the basis for the calculation, and the right to challenge these figures.

b. To the extent permitted by law, nonmembers may not participate in Union elections as a voter or as a candidate; attend Union meetings; serve as delegates to the Convention, or participate in the selection of such delegates; or participate in the process by which collective bargaining agreements are ratified.

2. PUBLICATION OF POLICY

The fees objector policy shall be published annually in the BLET's newsletter in the month preceding the objection notice period and mailed annually to each objector. It shall also be provided to each new employee when s/he first becomes subject to a union shop agreement.

3. MAKING OBJECTION KNOWN

Objecting nonmembers shall provide notice of objection by notifying the National Secretary-Treasurer of the objection by first-class mail postmarked during the month of November preceding the calendar year to which s/he objects, or within (30) days after s/he first begins paying fees and receiving notices of these procedures. The objection shall contain the objector's current home address. Nonmembers wishing to continue their objection from year to year must renew their objection each year as specified in this paragraph. Objections may only be made by individual employees. No petition objections will be honored.

4. MAJOR CATEGORIES OF CHARGEABLE EXPENSES

All objectors shall pay their fair share of expenses germane to collective bargaining including:

- a. All expenses concerning the negotiation of agreements, practices and working conditions;
- **b.** All expenses concerning the administration of agreements, practices and working conditions, including grievance handling, all activities related to arbitration, and discussion with employees in the craft or class (or bargaining unit) or employer representatives regarding working conditions, benefits and contract rights;
- c. Conversion expenses and $other\,union\,internal\,governance$ and management expenses;
- d. Social activities and union business meeting expenses;
- e. Publication expenses to the extent coverage is related to chargeable activities;
- f. Expenses of litigation related to collective bargaining, contract administration and internal governance;
- g. Expenses for legislative and administrative agency activities to effectuate collective bargaining agreements;
- h. All expenses for the education and training of officers and staff intended to prepare the participants to better perform chargeable activities;

i. All costs of strikes and other lawful economic actions.

5. DETERMINATION OF CHARGEABLE SHARE

The BLET shall perform an independent audit of the records of the National Division. The BLET shall determine the percentage of expenditures that fall within the categories specified in Section 4. The amount of expenditures that fall within Section 4 shall be the basis for calculating the reduced fees that must be paid by the objector. The auditing firm conducting the annual audit of the BLET National Division shall give an opinion concerning the adequacy of the escrow amounts maintained pursuant to Section 10, and later will verify the existence and the audits of money in any

6. REPORT OF CHARGEABLE SHARE AND BASIS OF ITS CALCULATION

The BLET shall report the determination no later than September 30. This report shall include an analysis of the major categories of union expenses that are chargeable and nonchargeable. A copy of the report shall be sent to all nonmembers whose timely objections have not been revoked.

7. CHALLENGE PROCEDURE

Each person entitled to receive the BLET's report may challenge the validity of the calculations by filing an appeal with the National Secretary-Treasurer. Such appeal must be made by sending a letter to the National Secretary-Treasurer postmarked no later than October 31.

8. ARBITRATION OF CHALLENGES

a. After the close of appeals period, the National Secretary-Treasurer shall provide a list of appellants to the American Arbitration Association (AAA). All

appeals shall be consolidated. The AAA shall appoint an arbitrator pursuant to its Rules for Impartial Determination of Union Fees. The AAA shall inform the National Secretary-Treasurer and the appellant(s) of the arbitrator selected.

b. The arbitration shall commence by December 1 or as soon thereafter as the AAA can schedule the arbitration. The arbitrator shall have control over all procedural matters affecting the arbitration in order to fulfill the need for an informed and expeditious arbitration.

c. Each party to the arbitrator shall bear their own costs. The appellants shall have the option of paying a pro-rata portion of the arbitrator's fees and expenses. The balance of such fees and expenses shall be paid by the BLET. d. A court reporter shall

- make a transcript of all proceedings before the arbitrator. This transcript shall be the official record of the proceedings and may be purchased by the appellants. If appellants do not purchase a copy of the transcript, a copy shall be available for inspection at the National Division during normal
- e. Appellants may, at their expense, be represented by counsel or other representative of choice. Appellants need not appear at the hearing and shall be permitted to file written statements with the arbitrator instead of appearing. Such statement shall be filed no later than fifteen (15) days after the transcript becomes available, but in no case more than thirty (30) days after the hearing closes.

f. Fourteen (14) days prior to the start of the first hearing, appellants shall be provided with a list of all exhibits intended to be introduced at the hearing and a list of all witnesses intended to be called, except for exhibits and witnesses that may be introduced for rebuttal. On written request from an appellant, copies of exhibits (or in case of voluminous exhibits, summaries thereof) shall be provided to them. Additionally, copies of exhibits shall be available for inspection and copying at the hearing.

g. The National Division shall have the burden of establishing that the reduced fees set forth in the report are lawful.

h. If the arbitrator shall determine that more than one day of hearings is necessary, hearings all be scheduled to continue from day to day until completed. The parties to the appeal shall have the right to file a brief within fifteen (15) days after the transcript of the hearing is available, but in no case no more than thirty (30) days after the hearing closes. The arbitrator shall issue a decision within forty-five (45) days after the submission of posthearing briefs or within such other reasonable period as is consistent with the rules established by the AAA.

i. The arbitrator shall give full consideration to the legal re $quirements \ limiting \ the \ amounts$ that objectors may be charged, and shall set forth in the decision the legal and arithmetic basis for such decision.

9. PAYMENT OF REDUCED FEES

Objectors shall pay reduced monthly fees based on the most recent report pending determination of the objection year's chargeable ratio.

10. ESCROW OF DISPUTED FUNDS

All monthly fees paid by objectors shall be placed in an interest-bearing escrow account pending final determination of the chargeable share. Escrowed funds shall be disbursed to objectors and the Union upon issuance of the arbitrator's decision or fifteen (15) days after the conclusion of the appeal period if there are no challenges to the determination.
