Setting the record straight

BLET ASKS FOR APOLOGY FOLLOWING MISLEADING WASHINGTON POST DRUG AND ALCOHOL ARTICLE

LET President Dennis R. Pierce blasted a careless and inaccurate report published in the Washington Post, calling on the newspaper to issue an apology to the men and women who operate Amtrak's locomotives.

On September 28, the Washington Post carried an article claiming to be based on a recent report by the Amtrak Inspector General. The headline read, "Amtrak watchdog says drug and alcohol use by train operators on the rise, causing safety risks." The article's lead sentence makes the false accusation that locomotive "engineers who operate Amtrak's trains have been testing positive for drugs and alcohol more frequently over the last six years."

President Pierce seethed at the misleading and inaccurate reporting. "Nothing could be further from the truth," the BLET

than 1,400 locomotive engineers tested positive for drug and alcohol use in 2011, and zero Amtrak locomotive engineers have tested positive for drugs and alcohol in post-accident testing since 1987."

In a Letter to the Editor of the Post, President Pierce set the record straight. He wrote that the September 28 article is contradicted by facts found in the Report of the Amtrak Inspector General (IG), upon which the article claims to be based.

In direct contrast to the inaccurate headline, the Amtrak Inspector Gener-

al report clearly states that "[n]one of Amtrak's locomotive engineers tested positive in 2011." Further, the IG report indicates that "locomotive engineers averaged only one positive test per year from 2006 through 2011."

"While one positive test per year is one too many, that rate simply does not justify the nearly hysterical headline and lead sentence used in the article," President Pierce said.

He also credited Operation RedBlock (ORB), the peer-to-peer drug and alcohol abuse prevention program in use at Am-

trak and several other Class 1 railroads.

"Not a single federally-reportable accident or incident has occurred in which a locomotive engineer tested positive in the post-accident/incident alcohol or drug test since the labor-developed, Amtrakadopted drug and alcohol identification program called Operation RedBlock was implemented in 1987."

Pierce concluded by calling on editors to apologize to the professional locomotive engineers who operate Amtrak's trains.

"Both Amtrak management and Amtrak labor have worked hard for a substance-free workplace for more than a quarter of a century. My membership has as strong an interest in achieving this goal as the traveling public does, and your article undermines that effort. The Post owes its readers much more stringent attention to detail in its reporting, and equally owes the men and women who operate Amtrak's trains an apology." @@

TEAMSTERS RAIL CONFERENCE BACKS HIGH-SPEED RAIL PROJECT

n a September 27 letter to Ray LaHood, Secretary of Transportation, Teamsters Rail Conference President Dennis R. Pierce voiced strong support for the DesertXpress highspeed rail project between Las Vegas and Los Angeles.

"If properly funded, the DesertXpress/XPress-West project will provide good middle class jobs for tens of thousands of Americans in the Southwestern United States," President Pierce wrote. "Equally important, the project will help our nation turn the corner in developing a 21st Century transportation system that is efficient, cost-effective and environmentally friendly."

DesertXpress/XPressWest would allow passengers to bypass highway traffic, traveling at speeds of up to 150 mph non-stop between southern California and Las Vegas in approximately 80 minutes (compared to an average highway drive time of approximately four hours).

The Teamsters Rail Conference represents more than 70,000 rail workers employed as locomotive engineers, trainmen and maintenance of way workers across the United States as members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen and Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employes Division. ©®

BLET PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BY DENNIS R. PIERCE

Moving forward

am writing this month's President's Message on my return trip from attending the inaugural meeting of the New Mexico State Legislative Board, which was held in Albuquerque on November 13. A few short months ago, BLET Divisions representing 25% of the active membership in the State of New Mexico petitioned the National Division to hold a membership referendum for the purpose of establishing a new State Legislative Board. As required by our Bylaws, my office prepared ballots consistent with the signed petitions, which were then sent to all active New Mexico members by their Division Secretary-Treasurers. By a margin of three to one, the rank and file membership in New Mexico voted "one member one vote" in favor of forming a new State Legislative Board. Once again, the democratic principles of our great Organization gave the membership the right to express their will, and I applaud them for not only participating, but for voting to make our union stronger with the addition of a new State Legislative Board in New Mexico.

Following the decision of the membership, steps were taken to convene the State Board for the first time and, during the meeting, Bylaws were adopted and officers were elected. I would like to congratulate all who were in attendance at the inaugural meeting as they, along with all BLET members in New Mexico, forged a new beginning for their State. Brother Pat Lynch, Legislative Representative for Division 446, was elected as Chairman of the New Mexico State Legislative Board and Sister Pam Cipolla, Legislative Representative-Elect for Division 400 was elected to serve as the Board's Secretary-Treasurer. As your Chief Legislative Officer, I was proud to join those attending the meeting, along with the other members of the National Legislative Board's Executive Committee: First Vice President Lee Pruitt and Vice President and National Legislative Representative John Tolman. It was our honor not only to thank these



new officers for serving our New Mexico membership, but also to congratulate them on their election as officers of the new Legislative Board.

This visit to meet with the membership in New Mexico marked the tenth time this year that I personally attended meetings with the officers and delegates of our State Legislative Boards, including: North Dakota, Massachusetts, Nebraska, Kansas, Louisiana, Colorado, Virginia, Arizona, and Washington. As I shared in my remarks with the membership in each of these states, my goal in travelling to these meetings is to ensure that our membership understands how vital a strong BLET legislative presence is to our membership. We can ill afford not to pay attention to what our elected government officials in Washington DC, or in a particular State are doing, because not protecting our interests allows for legislation that often comes at our expense. As proud American trade unionists, we must not only make sure that politicians who will support the working middle class are elected, but we must also be on constant guard to ensure that the middle class is indeed protected.

Our Brotherhood's strong legislative effort has produced legendary results for generations. From legislation protecting and improving our Railroad Retirement system and affording enforceable whistleblower rights protecting injured railroad workers, to regulations providing for crashworthy locomotive cabs, air conditioning and working cab locks, the BLET's Legislative Department has taken the point again and again to improve conditions for locomotive engineers and trainmen.

But we can't rest on our laurels; we need a continued strong legislative presence today, tomorrow and for years to come. Earlier this year we called out those who would harm Railroad Retirement and Medicare so that the privileged could receive even greater gifts from the federal government. And as President of the Teamsters Rail Conference, I joined with the Mineworkers and other Unions to fight against regulations that could be harmful to the coal industry ... and the tens of thousands of railroad jobs that coal supports.

These issues will not be going away simply because Election Day has passed. In fact, all these issues — and many others of vital importance to BLET members and their families — will resurface in the coming weeks and months. Our Union must remain vigilant in protecting the interests of locomotive engineers and trainmen, and the BLET's strong Legislative Department will stand post in that effort.

I will keep you updated concerning all these struggles and, when the time comes for us to move the ball forward, or to repel attacks against us, I will be counting on you to stand up with me to advance the BLET's agenda.

OBAMA WINS SECOND TERM AS U.S. PRESIDENT

Thanks BLET members for their support

n November 6, Barack Obama was reelected to his second term as President of the United States. He collected more than 300 electoral votes.

The BLET's Advisory Board, the organization's highest governing body, voted unanimously to endorse President Obama at a meeting on July 31. In congratulatory remarks issued on November 7, BLET National President Dennis R. Pierce wrote: "To President Obama I offer my congratulations on a victory that overcame many odds, not the least of which were a recovery from the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression, which has been tentative, and an onslaught of obscene amounts of corporate and billionaire campaign contributions that were unprecedented in this nation's history. Mr.

> President, you earned your reelection and you deserve a second term."

On October 4, President Obama thanked BLET members for their support.

"I am writing you today to personally thank you for your recent endorsement of my candidacy for re-election as President of the United States," President Obama wrote. "It is an honor and a privilege to accept the endorsement of an organization that represents the hardworking men and women who help build our nation's middle class and keep our nation's railroads running safe and sound."

Obama continued: "Railroads represent the

veins of commerce and tourism in our nation, and BLET/Teamsters members, and workers across the union family, represent the backbone of our country. The service you provide the American people is invaluable, which is why I will continue laying the foundation for economy built to last, where your hard work pays off, your responsibility is rewarded and everyone plays by the same rules."

In Congressional elections, Democrats retained control of the Senate while Republicans retained a majority in the House of Representatives. Key leaders of the House's Transportation & Infrastructure Committee were all reelected, leaving the Committee's make up for the 113's Congress virtually unchanged.

President Pierce also advised President Obama that the Organization will be keeping an eye on his support of key issues over the next four years. "We know, Mr. President, that you agree with us about what needs to be done to fully restore our nation's economic preeminence and we know you want to do it. The BLET will remain involved, and will continue to mobilize on the issues of importance to locomotive engineers, trainmen and all workers, and we will make you do what is necessary to restore the American Dream for working and middle class citizens. We will struggle every day to make sure that Washington does right by BLET members and all workers, Mr. President, because we're proud to be American and proud to be Union." @@

fficial communications between BLET members and the National Division require a hard copy of the correspondence, bearing a signature, being received by the National President to be considered an "official communication." This is to provide that the actual question(s) are addressed, and ensures that when official

interpretations are made they have reference to a specific request and can be used in future correspondence.

The volume of e-mails received makes it impossible for the National President to answer all unofficial communications. Therefore, it is the policy of the BLET that e-mails addressed to the National President will be reviewed and forwarded to the appropriate officer or staff for a timely response; however, an e-mail message is not considered an official communication.

Moreover, anonymous e-mails and emails that do not provide sufficient information concerning the sender to enable National Division staff to confirm the sender's membership status will not receive any reply or acknowledgement. This poli-

cy is intended to allow the National President to be aware of the opinions and suggestions of the membership, while at the same time providing a timely response to the member's unofficial communication, if a response is necessary, without needlessly expending limited BLET resources.

im R. Craver was reelected by acclamation to his second term as Chairman of the Virginia State Legislative Board at its quadrennial meeting in Richmond, Va., on September 29.

Brother Craver is a member of BLET Division 532 in Richmond. He joined the Brotherhood on December 1, 1998, and was first elected Chairman at the Board's quadrennial meeting on October 21, 2008.

All officers of the State Legislative Board were reelected by acclamation during the session, including: 1st Vice Chairman Michael W. Coleman, Division 561 (Richmond, Va.); 2nd Vice Chairman Gary A. Myers, Division 301 (Roanoke, Va.); Alternate 2nd Vice Chairman Barry L. Fannon, Division 167 (Andover, Va.); and Secretary-Treasurer, Jeffrey E. Wood, Division 26 (Richmond, Va.).

President Pierce addressed the delegates on a number of important topics, including the upcoming November elections, electronic devices, and the BLET membership card program.

hood," President Pierce said. "He and all members of the Board have done an excellent job of representing our hard-working members in Virginia, as evidenced by their unanimous reelections. I commend them and thank them for the job they've done."

During the session, Chairman Craver announced that the Board has recently established a new website, www.vslb.org. The site contains many important features, including an "Unsafe Condition Form" to help members document dangerous conditions at work. He also updated the delegates on efforts to secure crew van legislation in the state, which would improve safety conditions for members traveling in off duty vehicles, and stressed the importance of supporting and growing the BLET PAC fund.

Open enrollment for BLET Short Term Disability Plan runs through December 14

pen Enrollment for 2013 under the BLET's Short Term Disability insurance plan began on November 1, 2012 and runs through December 14, 2012.

If you are a locomotive engineer working on a railroad that participated in the Wage/Rules portion of the National Agreement dated December 16, 2003 (BNSF, NS and Amtrak did not participate in this Plan and this information does not apply to engineers working on these properties), then your coverage under Part A (described below) of the BLET Short Term Disability Plan will automatically continue.

Last year, if you opted out of Part B Coverage (also described below), you may opt back in during this enrollment period. If you currently participate and wish to opt out of Part B coverage, then you can also do so during this enrollment period.

PART A NON-OCCUPATIONAL DISABILITIES

Effective January 1, 2013, there will be no changes to Part A coverage:

- Your eligibility and \$40 premium is submitted by the railroad on a monthly basis.
- Part A pays \$402 per week for non-occupational disabilities only.
- Occupational disabilities are not covered.
- Each eligible member is insured for \$50,000 of Accidental Death and Dismemberment (AD&D) coverage.

PART B OCCUPATIONAL DISABILITIES

Effective January 1, 2013, the cost for Part B coverage will remain \$23 per month, with no additional changes:

- Part B is voluntary. Participation in this additional occupational coverage is not required.
- The weekly benefit for occupational disabilities is \$402 per week.
- Each eligible member is insured for an additional \$50,000 of AD&D coverage.
- The benefit is not subject to repayment upon receipt of a FELA settlement (no repayment after a personal injury settlement).

- The benefit is not considered taxable income.
- The premium will be payroll deducted with your monthly union dues.

NOTE: UTU members working as engineers are eligible for Part A and may purchase Part B coverage by making an annual payment of \$276 to the BLET Trust Fund. (Complete the form at the link below and return to address noted by December 14, 2012.)

- Provide information requested, including contact information for your attending physician(s).
- A Case Manager will be assigned and you will receive a file number, which you must keep available for future reference.
- Following the call, you will receive an authorization for release of medical information.
- Sign the document and return to MetLife.

IMPORTANT:

Eligibility for Part B is dependent on your eligibility for Part A. In order to be eligible for Part A, you must have seven (7) starts in a month with one (1) start as an engineer in the month prior to filing for disability. If you are furloughed to train service and become ineligible for Part A coverage, you must notify the Secretary-Treasurer of your local division immediately. At that time, you have three options:

- 1. Continue coverage of Part A and Part B by paying \$40 directly to the BLET Short Term Disability Trust Fund, by the 10th of the month and continuing payroll deduction of \$23 for Part B. Coverage may only be continued for six (6) months under this option. If you choose this option, you will need to contact the Plan Administrator (information below) for additional instructions.
- 2. Discontinue coverage of Part B temporarily until you return to engi-



neer status and become re-eligible for Part A. Engineers who lose Part A coverage due to no fault of their own, may resume coverage for Part B, once they return to engineer status and become re-eligible for Part A. You must keep the Secretary-Treasurer of your local division informed of your status.

3. OPT-OUT of Part B by completing an OPT-OUT form (link below). If you choose to opt-out of Part B, you may only resume coverage during a subsequent annual enrollment period.

CHOICES THAT MUST BE MADE BY DECEMBER 14, 2012

If you currently do NOT participate in Part B and choose to do nothing, you will continue to be eligible for Part A coverage only. If you are currently enrolled in Part B and wish to remain enrolled, then you are not required to take any action.

If you currently do NOT participate and would like to sign-up for Part B coverage during this open enrollment period, or if you DO currently participate and would like to opt-out of Part B coverage, you must complete and return the attached form (see below), by December 14, 2012, to the Secretary-Treasurer of your local division. Your election will become effective on January 1, 2013.

will not be eligible to enroll for the coverage until the next annual enrollment period.

DESIGNATION OF BENEFICIARY(IES)

You are able to designate your beneficiary(ies) for the AD&D coverage on-line. If you would prefer to submit a paper beneficiary form, it is available on MetLife's website. A simple registration process is required the first time you access www.metlife.com/mybenefits. Designating your beneficiary(ies) will ensure that your benefit proceeds are paid according to your wishes. If you do not have a designation of beneficiary(ies) on file, proceeds will be paid according to the AD&D plan's facility of payment clause. Beneficiary designation for this coverage will not impact beneficiary designations for any other Life Insurance or AD&D plans that you may have with MetLife.

Railroad unemployment benefits available for qualified Sandy's victims

uperstorm Sandy impacted a huge portion of the nation in late October, and it is likely that work for many BLET members will continue to be unpredictable for some time. As a result, some will be eligible for unemployment benefits pursuant to the Railroad Unemployment Insurance Act (RUIA), which is administered by the Railroad Retirement Board (RRB).

In order to qualify for benefits, an employee must have creditable railroad earnings in calendar year 2011 of at least \$3,325.00, counting only the first \$1,330.00 in earnings in each month. Additionally, a new employee must have railroad service in at least five months in 2011 in order to be eligible for RUIA benefits at this time.

National President Dennis R. Pierce urged BLET members to pull together in this time of urgent need. "Thousands and thousands of BLET

members, their families, and the communities in which they live are facing the challenge of a lifetime right now," Pierce said.
