Hours of Service Q&A now available online

he Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen has made available a list of Frequently Asked Questions regarding changes to the Hours of Service Act that are going into effect following passage of the 2008 Rail Safety Bill.

The document is available for download as a PDF from the BLET website at: http:// www.ble-t.org/pr/pdf/HOSFAQ.pdf

The FAQs concerning the new Hours of Service provisions represent the un-

derstanding and interpretation of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen only. They are subject to clarification, correction, and/or revision upon the Federal Railroad Administration publishing formal interpretations of applicable statutory provisions. They pertain only to "train employees" (i.e., operating craft employees), and

not to any other employees governed by the Hours of Service Act (e.g., signalmen and train dispatchers). The FAQs address key areas such as recordkeeping;

extra board issues; pool jobs; home terminal and away from terminal issues; working six consecutive days with two days off ("6&2"); the 276 hour monthly cap; un-

disturbed rest; eligibility to work; and a host of other related issues.

The National Division continues to field questions from the General Chairman regarding various scenarios that arise under the revised Hours of Service Act, and will continue to seek clarification from the Federal Railroad Administration. ®

Francis R. Byers,

FORMER CONRAIL VICE GENERAL CHAIRMAN

rancis R. Byers, former Chairman of Conrail Seniority District E and Alternate General Chairman, died after suffering a stroke on November 8.

Brother Byers, 87, is fondly remembered by his fellow BLET members as a dedicated leader who devoted 35 years of his life to union service. He hired out on the Pittsburgh Division of the former Pennsylvania Railroad, joining the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers on June 4, 1947.

He served the Brotherhood for many years as Local Chairman of Division 325 before earning promotion to the office of Vice General Chairman in 1968.



Brother Byers provided leadership during Conrail chaos.

He assumed the title of District Chairman of former Conrail Seniority District E, and also held the office of Alternate General Chairman for Conrail.

He retired in June of 1982 and

received a 60-year BLET membership pin in 2007. Upon his retirement, Brother Byers' position was filled by W.A. Thompson, current 2nd Vice Chairman of the Norfolk Southern-Southern Lines General Committee

HEALTH CARE

Cost sharing increase less than national average

ail worker cost-sharing contributions toward health and welfare coverage will increase slightly next year, but the increase will not be as much as originally

The monthly contribution will increase from \$166.25 per month to \$170.96 per month beginning January 1, 2009. However, it was expected that the rate would increase to as much as \$192 per month.

Health care for all rail labor unions is negotiated jointly through the Cooperating Railway Labor Organizations (CRLO). CRLO is a joint policy holder with the carriers of the Railroad Employees National Health and Welfare Plan, and participates in annual ratesetting meetings on an equal footing with the carriers.

According to the CRLO, the favorable trend in the medical premium for 2009 is in large part due to the removal of almost 20,000 ineligible dependents from the Plan through the recent eligibility audit — a savings of about \$30 million for 2009.

In addition, medical claims are predicted to increase at a far lower rate than the national average of all insurance plans due to the implementation of several significant plan improvements, such as Nurse Line, Custom Care Coordination, Disease management, Integrated Behavioral Health, and Wellness Programs (Healthy Weight and Smoking Cessation). All of these changes are designed to improve the health and medical treatment of participants, and thereby reduce the frequency and severity of illness.



The monthly premium rate for the medical portion of the Plan increased a very modest 2.1% to \$1,061.46. The Life and Accidental Death and Dismemberment premium decreased 10% to \$12.30, while the Dental Plan rate increased by 23.3% to \$55.98. The Vision Plan rate remained the same at \$10.00.

Employee cost-sharing amounts were set by the 2007 National Agreements at 15% of the premium rates for the above four components of members' insurance coverage (Medical, Life, Dental and Vision). The total amount of the four components for 2009 is \$1,139.74, which is an increase of \$31.40, or 2.8% over 2008. The 2009 cost-sharing amount is thus 15% of \$1,139.74, or \$170.96, an increase of \$4.71 over the current amount of \$166.25.

"Our cost-sharing increase was far lower than expected and well below the national average, which is a significant accomplishment," said BLET National President Ed Rodzwicz. "The BLET will continue to work diligently along with the CRLO to keep employee cost sharing to a minimum while moving ahead with the constant improvement of our membership's benefits." @@



FEDERAL EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY ACT (FELA)

Protection from retaliation

Carrier's often retaliate against their injured employees. These laws can help protect you.

n the last few years, railroaders who report injuries have confronted increasingly vindictive car-"Under the right riers. The carriers often retaliate against their injured employees with discipline and terminations. Fortunately, FELA lawyers have found some creative ways to protect their injured clients from retribution by the carriers.

> For clients who are not old enough to retire, the value of their jobs often far exceeds the value of any settlement or judgment that they might get after an injury. There are a host of state and Federal laws that can sometimes help an employee keep his or her job, even if they face retaliation or even a disability.

> First of all, even though grievances about working conditions, pay and even terminations must be grieved under the collective bargain

ing agreement (CBA), railroads are still covered by state and Federal employment discrimination law. That means that no matter what happens in a claim under the CBA, the railroad cannot discipline or fire their employees for reasons that are otherwise illegal.

Second, successful plaintiffs can recover damages for lost wages, emotional distress and attorney fees under most of these laws. Many of the laws allow a court award punitive damages and to force a carrier to reinstate a dismissed employee.

HERE ARE SOME LAWS THAT CAN BE USED TO PROTECT RAILROADERS:

 Federal Whistleblower Law: In August of 2007, a new law Federal law went into affect. That law prohibits carriers from retaliating against any employee who reports an injury or a condition that threatens to cause a serious injury. Employees can make a claim either as a grievance handled by their union, or they can make a complaint through OSHA. If OSHA dismisses the complaint, it can be brought in court.

 State wrongful dis**charge laws.** In many states it is illegal to retaliate against employees because they report injuries or sue their employers.

 Family Medical Leave Act. Under state and Federal Family Leave laws, it is illegal to retaliate against someone because they have applied for Family leave, or because they have taken family leave. Many employees who have been injured may be subject to protection under state or Federal Family Leave laws when they take time off to recuperate from their injuries. Courts can also force the carrier to allow the employee to take leave.

o Disability discrimina**tion.** Under the Americans with Disabilities Act, and similar state laws, it is illegal for an employer to discriminate against an employee because they have a disability. Moreover, employers may have an obligation to accommodate an employee with a disability, and it is also illegal to discriminate against an employee who has asked for an accommodation or even because the employer thinks the employee is disabled. These laws also generally permit a court to order the carrier to accommodate a disability.

It is important to remember that these laws almost always require cases to be started within two years or less — sometimes as soon as six months after the violation. Also, litigation under these laws is much more complicated than under the FELA. Under the right circumstances, however, these laws are powerful weapons for the protection of injured railroaders. @@





More than 40,000 Teamsters volunteered for the union's massive member mobilization efforts. Hoffa and General Secretary-Treasurer Tom Keegel barnstormed key battleground states across the country on multiple trips, talking to Teamster members and motivating them to volunteer and go to the polls for Obama.

The BLET played a key role in the Obama victory as well, generating support among rail and transportation workers. The BLET National Legislative Office in Washington, D.C. — in conjunction with the State Legislative Board Chairmen helped coordinate worksite leafleting campaigns, mailings, phone banks, and an early-voting campaign that encouraged members to vote by absentee ballot.

"You have chosen who will lead this country, and we are in a lot better shape today than we were before the election," said John Tolman, BLET Vice President and National Legislative Representative. "We now have a President who believes, as we believe, in the strength and value of American workers, who will ensure that railroad workers are protected in mergers, who will ensure that Amtrak is funded, and who will ensure that FELA and Railroad Retirement will survive well into the future.

Vice President Tolman also said there is now a labor-friendly majority in both

the U.S. House and U.S. Senate, "which will enable us to get more pro-worker legislation."

In addition, the BLET National Division sent a special mailing to active and retired members in key swing states, which helped turn the tide in Obama's favor in such states as Florida, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Virgina.

All this was part of the Teamsters' impressive get-out-the-vote push, which included:

More than 2.6 million direct mail

- More than 1.6 million phone calls • More than 40,000 volunteers
- More than 1 million Teamster job sites visited
- 54,687 Teamsters signed up for election text messaging
- 4.5 million doors knocked as part of Change to Win

Also, Teamsters conducted precinct walks, canvassed neighborhoods, drove voters to the polls and countless other activities. The union also incorporated new technology, like text messaging, predictive dialer phone banking, national and targeted-state interactive teleforums and microtargeting of swing voters.

"This is a great day -- a historic day," Hoffa said. "Now let's get this country unified and working for regular, middleclass Americans again. We elected a great man, but we can't stop here because our real work starts now." @@
