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FEDERAL COURT ORDERS UP TO PUT BLET OFFICERS, MEMBER BACK TO WORK

federal judge in El Paso, Texas has ordered Union Pacific Railroad (UP) to reverse the unlawful suspensions of a group of six members of the **Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers** and Trainmen (BLET) — five of whom are elected officers of Division 192 in El Paso. The judge ruled that all these union members had been wrongfully suspended by the UP in violation of the Railway Labor Act (RLA). UP had suspended these union members for a physical altercation at a private union meeting that was off-duty and completely off company premises.

On June 2, the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas, El Paso Division, issued a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) to halt Union Pacific's unjust suspension of the union officers, and the member, and condemned UP for its illegal interference in union activities. The court order further prohibits the railroad from spying on union activities. Rather than comply with the TRO, UP filed a Motion for Reconsideration and Dissolution, and demanded a hearing on the matter. The BLET was victorious again following a June 11 hearing when a federal judge in El Paso issued a Preliminary Injunction against UP reversing the suspension of the six members.

JUNE 2 RULING OF THE U.S. DISTRICT COURT FOR THE WESTERN DESTRICT OF TEXAS:

The TRO is in the public interest because the public has a strong interest in vindicating the RLA's public policy permitting employees to organize, choose their own representatives and bargain collectively free from interference, influence, or coercion by carriers.

"The TRO is in the public interest because the public has a strong interest in vindicating the RLA's public policy permitting employees to organize, choose their own representatives and bargain collectively free from interference, influence, or coercion by carriers," the Court wrote.

Also as part of the TRO, the court further determined that UP's suspension of the employees "... sends a clear message that the Carrier is willing to violate the law to coerce employees in their choice of representatives." Under the TRO, UP is restrained from subjecting BLET officers and members to surveillance, and is "restrained from unlawfully interfering with the Union in its representation capacities, including without limitation disciplining members of the Union and Union leadership for their involvement or support for the Union and its interests, objectives and/ or concerted protected activities."

The Preliminary Injunction found that "[i]t is essential that the Court issue temporary and preliminary injunctive relief to prevent immediate and irreparable injury" to the BLET in order preserve "employees' rights under the [Railway Labor Act to engage in organizing and union activity" The Court's Order also found that the Injunction was in the public interest, that "far more injury will be done to" the BLET in denying the Injunction than to UP from granting the Union's request, that there "is no adequate remedy at law for the stifling of rights to be free of undue interference, influence or coercion" caused by UP's conduct and that "there is a strong likelihood that [the BLET] will prevail in their arguments."

Accordingly, UP is "restrained and enjoined from engaging in surveillance of

the Union and its members" and "from unlawfully interfering with the Union in its representational capacities." UP also is "restrained and enjoined from unlawfully interfering with, influencing and/or coercing UP employees represented by BLET and its representatives" and was again ordered to "reinstate to work in their former positions" the Division 192 officers and member who had been removed from service.

BLET National President Dennis R. Pierce said the court's ruling was a victory for the BLET and its members.

"The court vindicated our rights as union members to conduct our business, hold meetings, and elect representatives without outside interference from railroad carriers," President Pierce said. "I want to

EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE

ne of the fundamental reasons the BLET is the oldest union in North America is our long history of the membership making the most important decisions that govern our affairs. It is this culture of internal democracy that has enabled our Brotherhood to represent locomotive engineers — and, since 2005, trainmen — for over 158 years.

In the coming months, all active BLET members will have another opportunity to select the leaders who will guide our Union in the coming years. High levels of participation in the election process deliver a powerful message to the railroads, and the government, that BLET members are informed and involved.

In September, each of the BLET's 474 Local Divisions will hold its triennial nomination of officers. Among the 20 Division officers to be elected are:

- the President, who presides over all division meetings and is the division's principal officer;
- the Secretary-Treasurer, Trustees and Alternate Trustees, who will manage the Division's finances in an open and transparent manner;
- the Local Committee of Adjustment, who serve as the Division's delegates to the General Committee of Adjustment (GCA) and who are responsible for enforcing the collective bargaining agreement(s) under which the Division's members work;
- and the Legislative Representative, who serves as the Division's delegate to the State Legislative Board (SLB) and who is tasked with responsibilities pertaining to the safety and sanitation of the working environment and the political education for the members of the division.

For GCAs that are comprised of a single Division, the election of the Local Committee of Ad-

justment also determines who will serve as the GCA's officers.

September's nominations also will include the offices of Delegate to the National Division, First Alternate Delegate to the National Division, and Second Alternate Delegate to the National Division. The election of these delegates is particularly important because the BLET's Fifth National Convention will be held from October 10−13 of next year. In convention assembled, these delegates will consider resolutions to improve the representation provided by the BLET at all levels, and will nominate candidates for National Division offices for the 2023–2027 term.

Local Division officers are the foundation of our Organization; they are the first link in the chain that unites our Brotherhood. The thousands of men and women who serve as officers at the Division level also provide the information needed for GCAs, SLBs and the National Division to successfully address issues that cannot be resolved locally.

Triennial Division elections

not only allow all members to choose their leaders for the next 3-year term, they also provide an opportunity for members to become more involved in our Brotherhood on a day-to-day basis by becoming a candidate for office. Every GCA, SLB and National Division officer began their career in Union service as a Division officer.

If you have something to contribute to the success of the BLET, I strongly urge you to consider accepting nomination for office in September. At the very least, you should show your support for Brothers and Sisters you want to represent you by nominating them in September.

The eligibility rules for nominating someone, being nominated for office, voting in an election and being elected to office are governed by a combination of federal laws and regulations, the IBT Constitution, and the BLET Bylaws. in a full-time BLET position during this period. In order to nominate someone for Division officer, a member must have paid dues in the month of July.

Similarly, in order to be elected to Division office in December, a member must have paid dues for 24 consecutive months through October of this year, and also have worked in the craft or served in a full-time BLET position during this period. And in order to vote in the Division triennial election in December, a member must have paid dues in the month of October.

In order to help all BLET members understand the Division triennial election process, the National Division has updated our On the Right Track publication for the 2021 triennial election. A PDF version of On the Right Track is available in the Members' Area on the BLET website at https:// www.ble-t.org/members/On-TheRightTrack.asp. BLET members who do not have a Members' Area account can sign up for a username and a password at https://www.bleAlso — for the first time in 15 years — the BLET's triennial Division elections coincide with the IBT's election of International Officers. As Teamsters, all BLET members who are eligible to vote may participate in the election of these IBT Officers, including the General President, the General Secretary-Treasurer, various At-Large and Regional Vice Presidents, and International Union Trustees.

With the pending retirement of Jim Hoffa, this fall's election will produce a new Teamsters General President for the first time in over 20 years. Ballots for the Teamsters International Officer Election will be mailed on Monday, October 4, 2021, and the ballot count will commence on Monday, November 15, 2021. In order to be eligible to vote in the Teamsters International Officer Election, a member must have paid dues in the month of September.

Your participation in the triennial division election process and in the Teamsters International Officer Election is no less important than your participation in contract ratification votes, and in other matters within your Division. You have a voice in your representation, and in your wages and working conditions, and your voice needs to be heard.

To me, one of the core duties of Union membership is exercising the right to vote. We routinely top 50% participation in contract ratification votes, and regularly have significantly better participation. Our goals for this fall's elections should be to top those numbers.

I will be voting in my Division's triennial election this fall, and in the Teamsters International Officer Election. I hope you will, too.

reference to a specific request and can be used in future correspondence.

The volume of e-mails received makes it impossible for the National President to answer all unofficial communications. Therefore, it is the policy of the BLET that e-mails addressed to the National President will be reviewed and forwarded to the appropriate officer or staff for a timely

response; however, an e-mail message is not considered an official communication.

Moreover, anonymous e-mails and e-mails that do not provide sufficient information concerning the sender to enable National Division staff to confirm the sender's membership status will not receive any reply or acknowledgement. This policy is intended to allow the National

President to be aware of the opinions and suggestions of the membership, while at the same time providing a timely response to the member's unofficial communication, if a response is necessary, without needlessly expending limited BLET resources.

U.S. Workers would benefit FROM BUY AMERICAN CHANGES

.S. workers are the best in the world. But over the last several decades, their workplace efforts have been undercut by the desire of corporations to fatten their wallets as much as possible by sending as many jobs as possible overseas.

Instead of intervening to help more and more hardworking Americans struggling to make ends meet, the federal government largely remained on the sidelines. As a result, middle-class workers saw their wages stagnate as the fortunes of big business and those at the top of the economic ladder soared.

But now, thanks to the work of the Biden administration, real change is on the horizon. And the latest example comes in the form of proposed rulemaking that would ensure pur-

chases made by the U.S. government support products manufactured and services provided by American workers, following through on a promise President Biden made when he first took office earlier this year.

As part of the proposal, U.S.-made content in the products the American government buys would increase from 55 percent now to 75 percent in 2029, the largest such proposed change in the Buy American Act since it was implemented almost 90 years ago. Under the updated regulations, mandated American content would rise to 60 percent upon implementation and grow to 65 percent in 2024 before reaching the 75 percent threshold.

The potential effect on U.S. jobs is significant. With \$600 billion in annual procurement spending, almost half of which is in manufac-

tured products from helicopter blades to trucks to office furniture, the federal government is a major buyer in a number of markets for goods and services, including the single largest purchaser of consumer goods in the world.

This rule change is a win for workers. It is well past time that hardworking Americans are recognized by their leaders and rewarded for their efforts. It's time that more in the workforce get an opportunity for greater hours and higher pay. That's how this nation can and will Build Back Stronger.

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BLET mourns passing of Washington State Legislative Board Chairman Shahraim Allen

fficers, members and staff of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen (BLET) are deeply saddened to learn of the unexpected passing of Washington State Legislative Board Chairman Shahraim C. Allen, who died on June 24, 2021. He was 45 years old.

Brother Allen was a third-generation railroader who belonged to BLET Divi-

sion 238 in Tacoma, Washington. In 1994, he hired out as a switchman for the Burlington Northern, earning promotion to locomotive engineer on December 20, 1995. Brother Allen joined the

Brotherhood on June 1, 2001. He was elected three times to serve the Brotherhood as Chairman of the Washington State Legislative Board. He was first elected in 2012 and subsequently reelected by acclamation at quadrennial meetings in 2016 and 2020.

During his tenure as Chairman, the Board secured important legislative improvements to better the lives and safety of railroad workers. Brother Allen led

the Brothers and Sisters of the Washington State Legislative Board as they successfully lobbied for passage of a safety bill that mandated a minimum crew size of two qualified professionals in the cab of the locomotive, which was signed by Governor Jay Inslee on March 27, 2020. Also under Brother Allen's leadership, the Board lobbied to help to secure passage of one of the nation's most comprehensive train crew transportation safety laws, which was signed into law by Governor Inslee on May 16, 2017.

"Countless railroaders have benefitted from the legislative safety improvements that have been secured in the State of Washington thanks to the determination and leadership of our late Brother Shahraim Allen," BLET National President Dennis R. Pierce said. "Brother Allen was a natural born leader who served our Union with distinction during his tenure as Chairman of the Washington State Legislative Board. He was one of the brightest young leaders

of our Brotherhood but his time on earth has been tragically cut short. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him. On behalf of the 57,500 men and women of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen, I extend our deepest and most heartfelt sympathies to the friends and family of Shahraim Allen during this difficult time."

BILL WOULD FUND CRITICAL RAIL AND OTHER INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS AS WELL AS MANDATING IMPORTANT SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS FOR RAIL WORKERS

he Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen thanked members of Congress for their ongoing support of the INVEST in America Act (H.R. 3684), which was passed by the U.S. House of Representatives on July 1. The bill would fund critical rail and other infrastructure needs, while mandating important safety improvements for rail workers.

The INVEST in America Act would authorize \$547 billion in spending over five years on surface transportation, mandate two-person crews on freight trains, provide for mandatory train crew changes at the U.S.-Mexican border, and triple

But in the end, the bill retained a provision to mandate crew changes at the southern border as well as a requirement for two-person train crews — both key issues for the BLET and its members.

The full House of Representatives passed it by a vote of 221-201 on July 1.

"I thank the legislators in the House of Representatives who voted in favor of the INVEST in America Act," BLET National President Dennis R. Pierce said. "The safety measures contained in this bill will go a long way toward improving safety in the railroad industry and protecting the lives of railroad workers and citizens throughout the United States whose communities are near railroad lines. I also thank the BLET National Legislative Office and the Teamsters Legislative Department for their ongoing efforts to ensure the passage of this bill. As I said previously, this is one step in a lengthy process, but it is encouraging to see what we can accomplish when we elect worker-friendly legislators to govern our great nation."

BLET Vice President and National Legislative Representative Vince Verna said: "I'd like to thank Chairman DeFazio and his staff and all the Democrats who supported this bill, in addition to Republican Congressmen Fitzpatrick (PA-1) and Smith (NJ-4) for their helpful votes to pass the bill. They all worked hard with BLET to get it right."

It is expected that the U.S. Senate will take up the INVEST in America Act in the coming weeks. ®

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BLET honors President Hoffa at Austin regional meeting

ational President Dennis R. Pierce honored Jim Hoffa, General President of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, with an engraved brass bell during opening ceremonies of the BLET's regional meeting held on July 13, 2021, in Austin, Texas.

President Pierce presented the bell on behalf of the 57,500 men and women of the BLET in recognition of General President Hoffa's pending retirement, which will become effective in early 2022. Hoffa has spent the past 23 years leading the world's most powerful labor union.

"Thank you, Brother Jim, for your leadership and congratulations on a remarkable career," President Pierce said. "On behalf of all BLET members, I want to also thank you for your vision of uniting all transportation workers in the strongest Union in America, which led directly to the creation of the Teamsters Rail Conference."

President Pierce began the day by calling the meeting to order with more than 315 members and families in attendance. After presentation of the flags by the Austin Fire Department Honor Guard, Brother Gary Pedigo, Chairman of the Texas State Legislative Board, delivered the in-



vocation. Brother Pedigo has been a member of the BLET for over 42 years and also serves the Brotherhood as the Legislative Representative of BLET Division 177 (Denison, Texas).

President Pierce then welcomed all members, families and guests to Austin. Pierce, President, Teamsters Rail Conference announced on June 30 that the Teamsters Rail Conference, following a unanimous vote by its Policy Committee, has joined the U.S. **High Speed Rail Coalition Executive Com**mittee. The Committee is comprised of passenger and high-speed rail stakeholders, proponents and supporters from all corners of the Nation.

The Committee's Campaign will focus on educating elected officials at all levels of government, as well as the public, of the benefits of federal investment in expanding high speed rail service. Among the key goals of the Campaign are:

- a minimum of \$205 billion for true highspeed rail:
- the establishment of a Rail Trust Fund;
- the formation of a High Speed Rail Development Agency within USDOT; and
- · maintaining the robust labor standards outlined in the American High Speed Rail Act.

The Teamsters Rail Conference is comprised of two Divisions, the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employes Division (BM-WED) and the Brotherhood of Locomotive **Engineers and Trainmen Division (BLET). As** such, the Teamsters Rail Conference Policy Committee is comprised equally of BMWED and BLET voting members. As part of its approval to join the High Speed Rail Coalition **Executive Committee, the Policy Committee** also agreed that both Divisions and their respective Crafts would be equally represented on the Executive Committee. BLET Vice **President and National Legislative Repre**sentative Vince Verna and BMWED Director of Government Affairs Jeff Joines will serve as the joint representatives and spokesmen for the Teamsters Rail Conference.

BLET Vice President Verna said, "I am very happy that BLET and BMWED can lead the Teamsters Rail Conference as part of a high speed rail coalition. This is to ensure that the HSR coalition includes labor rights as a main priority. We are happy Congress is seeking the funding for high speed rail while also protecting funding for Amtrak and other intercity and passenger rail systems. Our members who move today's passengers are essential and we are eager to represent rail workers who will work on high speed rail systems in the future."

BMWED Director Joines said, "The BM-WED is excited to be a part of the High Speed Rail Coalition along with the BLET. HSR will transform our communities and the way we travel in the 21st century, along with providing good paying union railroad jobs well into the future. We call on Congress to meet the long-needed increased funding for highspeed rail around the country." ©®

RRB Labor Member reminds railroaders about importance of Form BA-6

BLET EDITOR'S NOTE: THE FOLLOW-ING IS A MESSAGE TO RAIL LABOR FROM JOHN BRAGG, LABOR MEMBER OF THE U.S. RAILROAD RETIREMENT BOARD.

he Railroad Retirement Board (RRB) is still operating in a remote capacity — with field offices closed to the public. Hopefully, in the not too distant future, I will be writing to advise you of plans for getting back to normal operations. Now, however, I am writing to share a friendly reminder with you about action which every active employee should take on an annual basis — and may be of particular importance this year to some, in light of the unique work circumstances many encountered.

Each year, on or before the last day of February, employers must report service and compensation for each employee who performed compensated service in the preceding calendar year. The RRB, in turn, credits the service and compensation records of individual employees based upon these reports and in June of every year, the RRB releases Form BA-6 to each employee for which compensated service for the preceding year was reported. The Form | review their annual Forms BA-6 to make BA-6 contains the information recently reported for the preceding year, as well as the form is accurate. preceding years. For example, the Forms BA-6 which were released by the RRB in mid-June of 2021 will contain service and compensation reported for the years 2017 through 2020. Regardless of the amount earned, the amount of compensation shown on the Form BA-6 will always be limited by the maximum creditable

tier I compensation amount for the calendar year. For calendar years 2017 through 2020, the maximum amounts creditable are \$127,200, \$128,400, \$132,900 and \$137,700, respectively. In addition to showing the creditable compensation for the years 2017 through 2020, the Form BA-6 issued in mid-June of 2021 will show the months for which the employer reported railroad service for the employee during the years 2017-2020.

It is critical that individual employees

sure that all the information contained on dition to validating the creditable

compensation, it is important

to check to see if the employer properly reported the months for which credit was given by the employer for a month of railroad service. Every month for which you believe you should have credit for railroad service should be coded with a "1". If the code is "0", you will not receive credit for any

railroad service for that month. If the code is "D" then you will receive credit for railroad service pursuant to the rules governing the deeming of service months.

Employees who received pay for time lost, especially as a result of arbitration proceedings, during the years 2017 through 2020 are reminded of the importance of checking their Forms BA-6. RRB regulations at 20 C.F.R. § 209.15(b) provide that compensation which is pay for time lost must be reported with respect to the year

in which the time and compensation were lost. However, it is not uncommon for the individuals responsible for completing reports of service and compensation to be unfamiliar with how to report pay for time lost, or to lack awareness that the compensation they are reporting reflects pay for time lost. As a result, the compensation is mistakenly reported for the year paid AND the service months for which the time and compensation were lost are not credited as railroad service months. Situations where this is most likely to occur are arbitration decisions resulting in the employee being reinstated with all rights and benefits unimpaired and receiving compensation for lost time.

REMEMBER: The law limits the period during which corrections to service and compensation records may be filed to four years from the date the report was due at the RRB, so it is very important for employees to request a correction within that period of time. Any railroad employee who thinks that the Form BA-6 contains an error should be certain to follow the directions on how to file with the RRB a protest of the information contained on the Form BA-6. ©

BE SURE TO MAKE ANY CORRECTIONS BEFORE THE DEADLINE:

In June of every year, the RRB releases **Form BA-6** to each employee for which compensated service for the preceding year was reported. The Form BA-6 contains the information recently reported for the preceding year, as well as the information reported for three preceding years. It is critical that individual employees review their annual Forms BA-6 to make sure that all the information contained on the form is accurate.
